 - WHEREAS, equity recognizes no distinction between a "complaint" and a "grievance"; and
 - WHEREAS, the existing procedures for processing academic complaints have not always served the requirements of due process and the demands of justice; and

- WHEREAS, the existing procedures do not provide for processing certain types of academic complaints, particularly those involving conflicts of interests; therefore be it
- RESOLVED, that the American Association of University Professors, University of Delaware Chapter, be advised to effect the following changes in the collective bargaining agreement during future negotiations.
 - 1. That Step #4 (Vice President for Academic Affairs) carry a time limit of ten days;
 - 2. That decisions at Step #3 (University Senate Review Committee) and Step #4, along with subsequent exchanges between these steps, be published, with appropriate measures to protect personal identities, in the minutes of the University Faculty Senate;
 - 3. That a mechanism be established for processing complaints against actions at the levels of the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Office of the President (e.g., approval for foreign travel, sabbatical leaves, grant endorsement, etc.);
 - 4. That provisions be made for processing complaints regarding actions of the committees of the University Faculty Senate (e.g., decisions involving personnel actions and/or academic judgments);
 - 5. That distinctions between complaints and grievances be made with more specificity.

A. Elections of Senate officers, a chairperson of the Coordinating Committee on Education, two members-at-large of the Committee on Committees, one member of the Rules Committee, and three members of the Nominating Committee.

Senators are reminded that additional nominations may be made from the floor and that senators making such nominations are responsible for determining that a nominee would serve if elected.]

RESOLVED, that the appointments to Senate committees and the appointments of Senate committee chairpersons, as presented in Attachment 3 of this Agenda, are hereby confirmed.

RESOLVED, that the Faculty Senate Bylaws III: Standing Committee System of the Faculty and its Senate, Committee on Student and Faculty Honors (p. I-24 of the present <u>Faculty Handbook</u>) reads as follows:

STUDENT AND FACULTY HONORS, COMMITTEE ON

This committee shall recommend the policies governing the granting of student honors, and shall administer such policies as are adopted by the faculty or its Senate, and approved by the Board of Trustees. It may also recommend to the President nominees for faculty honors and for graduate student honors.

It shall consist of one member from each college, one of whom shall be chairperson; two undergraduate students and one graduate student; a designee of the Director of the University Honors Program, and an appointee of the President.

E. Recommendation from the Committee on Adjunct Academic Affairs (M. Miller, chair) and from the Committee on Undergraduate Studies (V. Arnsdorf, chair) for approval of guidelines pertaining to undergraduate off-campus study or field experiences. (Attachment 4)

WHEREAS field experiences represent an increasingly important aspect of undergraduate education of particular significance to University-community relations, and

WHEREAS field experiences vary greatly in course requirements, methods of evaluation and supervision in the field, and

WHEREAS student, faculty, field supervisor interaction and agreement is essential to improved field experience learning and enhanced University-community relations, and

WHEREAS the University presently does not have a procedure to collect information on field experiences systematically and, therefore, is hampered in generating suitable academic guidelines for field experiences,

BE IT RESOLVED that instructors of courses involving field experience utilize a field experience contract documenting student, faculty and field supervisor responsibilities, the method and source of student evaluation and the part played by field experience evaluation in the determination of the course grade, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of the contract signed by the student, instructor and department chair be maintained by the department and the Office of Career Planning and Placement.
