

Philosophy provides training in basic methods of reasoning, both clear thinking procedures for everyday decision making and more formal techniques of logical analysis. It examines fundamental issues and ideas about our knowledge and values. It furnishes a critical perspective on the methods and results of other disciplines.

A major, a minor, or a concentration in philosophy is a useful background for many careers including the teaching of philosophy. Majors often go on to graduate work in other arts and science disciplines, as well as to further schooling in law, theology, education, data processing, or business. In general, philosophy offers all students opportunities to develop their critical and analytical skills.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE

5 tudents in the Clinical Nurse Specialist and Nursing Administration concentrations must complete 36 credit hours of graduate study for the M.S.N. Those pursuing the Family Nurse Practitioner concentration must complete 47 credit hours. All students take at least 15 credits of core courses and research.

All students have the option of writing a thesis or of electing a non-thesis scholarly project to meet the program requirements. Those who choose to write a thesis conduct the necessary research and receive six credits (NURS 869) for the completed study. Students who select a non-thesis option are expected to complete 9 credits of elective course work in areas supportive of the project and 3 credits (NURS 868) for a scholarly project.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE POST-MASTER'S FAMILY NURSE PRACTITIONER CERTIFICATE

The Post-Master's Certificate option is designed to provide individuals who already hold a Master of Science in Nursing degree with the core courses and clinical experiences necessary for eligibility for family surse practitioner certification.

The program is currently offered only on a part-time basis, but it is possible to go full time for some semesiars. The program consists of 29 credits. Students will have up to five years to complete the program. Upon completion of this program, students will be qualified to set for the national certifying examination.

Chucal learning experiences are arranged in a variety of semings to meet program objectives and student interests. Many experiences are located in health care facilities in Delaware and surrounding commissions. For students who currentize a long distance to campus, chincal experiences may be arranged at agencies closer to their residences.

For required courses, see Family Nurse Practitioner specialty courses marked with an asterisk.

APPLICATION PROCESS

To apply to the post-master's certificate program you must submit an application and an official transcript of your undergraduate and master's degrees to the University of Delaware. Three letters of recommendation should be sent to the Graduate Program at the College of Nursing, An interview with a faculty member is also required.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE POST-DEGREE CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN NURSING ADMINISTRATION

ADMISSION

- 1. B.S.N. or M.S. from a college or university accredited by the NLN.
- 2. Cumulative undergraduate grade point index of 2.75 on a fourpoint scale (GPI of 3.0 for upper division nursing courses).
- Licensure in Delaware or in the state where clinical practice is arranged.
- 4. Six to nine months recent experience to nursing administration,

COMPLETION REQUIREMENTS

Program paracipants must complete three required graduate credit courses in the College of Nursing including one clinical component. In addition, paracipants also must complete two short programs from among the following professional development curriculum offerings through Commung Education:

- · communication
- management
- computer applications

Professional development curriculum programs are offered by the Division of Continuing Education, and their formats, costs, and time requirements may vary (Short programs usually require from 1) sessions. They may be taken prior to the required graduate courses in any sequence.)

The three required graduate credit courses are selected academic courses in the College of Nursing. They run during Fall and Spring University semesters and are subject to the University's regular academic policy guidelines and catendars. Faculty advisors from the Department of Advanced Nursing Science will assist students in arranging the nursing clinical component required for completion of the certificate requirements.

ATTACHMENT 5

DEVELOPMENT OF ADDITIONAL POST MASTER'S CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS

WHEREAS the University Senate approved a post master's certificate for the Family Nurse Practitioner program in 1993 for individuals who already hold a Master of Science in Nursing and are now interested in being certified as a Nurse Practitioner, and

WHEREAS the College of Nursing has had numerous requests from current student to assist them in being educated in two specialties within Nursing at the graduate level, and

UMEREAS the National Lasgue for Mursing (the national accrediting body for the College of Nursing) has just issued a statement (summer, 1993) strongly recommending that advanced practice murses will be better able to serve the health care needs of society in a more cost effective manner if they are prepared in more than one area of specialization.

THEREFORE, THE DEPARTMENT OF NURSING REQUESTS THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A POST MASTER'S CERTIFICATE IN THE FOLLOWING SPECIALTIES:

Nursing of Children Nursing of Hothers and Newborns Cardiopulmenary Mursing Oncology/Immune Deficiency Nursing Gerentological Mursing

These are all existing programs within the graduate program. No additional resources are needed by the College of Nursing in order to provide these courses, no additional courses need to be developed. No additional faculty are needed. Post master's students would be admitted into respective tracks only if open slots were available.

All graduate students complete required core courses and research and statistics requirements. Each area of specialization above has three require clinical courses and some have an additional didactic course that is required

It is the intent of this proposal that students will be awarded a post master's certificate after completing the following didactic and clinical courses that were not covered in their graduate education
