**RESOLVED**, that the University Faculty Senate approves the merger of the Department of Food Science and Department of Animal Science and Agricultural Biochemistry into a single Department of Animal and Food Sciences, effective upon approval by the Board of Trustees.

Assoc Outside evaluator of programs at other universities. Member of a disciplinary task force appointed by the Amer. Assoc. of Colleges to evaluate university curriculums for the 21st century. (As a member of a task force and a participant at AAC meetings I was able to contribute my knowledge of the current state of American higher education.)

These experiences have enabled me to understand the current state of American higher education and the role of university faculty serves as participants in academic decision making.

## **GOALS STATEMENTS OF THE CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT ELECT**

### **James Morrison**

Today, entering freshmen are seeking the latest technology, interactive learning formats, and a personable supportive faculty. The hope is that they will be entering a learning environment that demonstrates that the University community indeed cares about their future. The role of the Faculty Senate is to make University resources easily accessible to the students who are ultimately our customers.

To accomplish this objective requires a unity of purpose. It is imperative that we create an environment that reflects an expanding network of individuals (faculty, students, alumni, and parents) that results in the formation of the T.E.A.M. concept (Together Everyone Accomplishes More).

- Together suggests that the more input we generate from all aspects of the University community, the more effective the Senate can be;
- Everyone has the right to express opinions and ideas in an open environment;
- Accomplishments may more readily be attained if the ingenuity of those involved is permitted to evolve, rather than simply following practices of the past;
- More can be achieved if effective networks of individuals can be formed using less time, effort, and paperwork.

The brevity of this statement symbolizes this platform reflecting the need to accomplish more in less time by devising new schemes that better manage the time, resources, and talent of those Senators elected to represent the best interests of the University community.

### **Marian Lief Palley**

I believe that faculty governance is central to maintaining a strong and positive relationship between the faculty and the administration of the University. Faculty members should be more involved in University governance. They should be initiators in all activities that have a bearing on the decision making that affects the nature and scope of the academic enterprise.

The Faculty Senate, as the representative arm of the University faculty, must be actively involved in activities as diverse as curriculum, budgetary decision making, and long-range planning. The Senate should be more than a reactive body. The Senate should be a pro-active organization whose members are initiators of policies and not just respondents to proposals for change. As President of the Senate I would work to expand the communication channels between the faculty and the administration with an eye to advancing the Senate's policy initiation role.

If I am elected I will continue to facilitate the free exchange of ideas between members of the faculty and between the administration and the faculty. I believe that talk is necessary to keep channels of information open. However, I also believe that talk has its limits. The Senate's purpose is to look after the interests of the University and its faculty. Actions must be taken and talk alone is not sufficient. Thus, I fully endorse the principle of short meetings proposed and facilitated by the present Senate President.

The current Women's Studies Minor require the following course distribution:

- WOMS 201: Introduction to Women's Studies (3 credits)
- One course satisfying either A&S Groups A or B General Education Requirement (3 credits)
- Two courses at or above the 300 level (6 credits)
- Two elective courses in WOMS or cross-listed with WOMS (6 credits)
- Note: No more than 6 credits in Women's Studies experimental courses (X67 numbered) may be counted toward the 18-credit requirement.

The new text should read:

- WOMS 201: Introduction to Women's Studies (3 credits)
- Two courses in WOMS or cross-listed with WOMS at or above the 300 level (6 credits)
- Three elective courses in WOMS or cross-listed with WOMS (9 credits)
- Note: No more than 9 credits may be taken in any one department. No more than 6 credits in WOMS experimental courses (X67-numbered) may be counted toward the 18-credit requirement

**ATTACHMENT 4**

**RATIONALE FOR REVISION OF EXISTING MAJOR  
IN EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT AND EDUCATION**

The State of Delaware recently approved new certification requirements. Programs must demonstrate progress toward meeting the intent of the new requirements for students entering in the fall of 1995. The proposed changes are designed to meet this intent in the following ways:

1. General education requirements have been made more specific, emphasizing content knowledge in literature/writing, science and mathematics, and social studies.
2. A required course in "Professional Issues" has been added, again to be consistent with new certification requirements. (This course has already been through the University approval cycle).
3. To allow for these new requirements, the following deletions have been made:
  - a. 3 credits of the College requirement have been removed. Students will choose either NTDT 200 or a TDCE course.
  - b. 6 credits of free electives have been deleted

These changes will leave the minimum credits for graduation at 129; however, some students will require additional credits depending on the certification option(s) they select.

Discussions have been held with chairs of relevant departments. Supporting materials are attached.

RE: Disestablishment of the Major in Textile Science (TSC)

On December 8, 1994, after careful consideration, the majority of faculty in the Department of Textiles, Design and Consumer Economics voted (7 for, 3 against, 1 abstention) to disestablish our Textile Science major. Textile Science is one of four, closely-related majors offered in the Department. There is currently no enrollment in the Textile Science major; our last graduating students entered in 1984 and 1987. Student enrollment in textile science courses, however, remains high as these courses are still an integral part of the Department's majors in Apparel Design and in Textiles and Clothing: Merchandising. Thus, the elimination of the Textile Science major notwithstanding, we are committed to continuing textile science courses.

We, therefore, offer the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the majority of faculty in the Department of Textiles, Design and Consumer Economics has recommended the elimination of the major in Textile Science, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Textile Science major is to be disestablished effective September 1, 1995.

The merge of the Department of Animal Science and Agricultural Biochemistry with the Department of Food Science has been considered by the faculty and administration for approximately two years, and after thorough discussion and debate, we reached the conclusion that it would be in the best interest of both departments and the College of Agricultural Sciences to request that the merge be formalized. We propose to rename the merged departments the Department of Animal and Food Sciences.

We firmly believe that the research, teaching and outreach programs will be strengthened and the environment for improved collaboration will be increased while administrative redundancy and overhead will be reduced.

A nationwide survey of other institutions has documented that this type of merge is not unique. It is indeed very common to have joint faculty appointments at institutions that have separate Animal and Food Science Departments and not at all uncommon for the two units to merge when it is deemed appropriate to meet the overall goals of the departments and/or colleges involved.

It is the consensus of the two departments and the college that the merge should occur without further delay because of our apparent joint interests and the implicit benefits to our students and other constituent groups.

To facilitate the merge the faculty, in consort with the department and college administrators, have revised and approved all governing documents and have included them along with a complete personnel listing for your information and review. Also included in the introductory section is information on enrollment trends and extramural funding patterns as compared to other units in the College of Agricultural Sciences.

Attached are the documents to complete the merger of the Department of Animal Science and Agricultural Biochemistry and the Department of Food Science. As we discussed in our meeting on Oct. 31, we are asking for the approval of: 1. Bylaws of the Department 2. Promotion and Tenure Policy; 3. Graduate Policy; and 4. Undergraduate Policy for the new Department of Animal and Food Sciences.

The rational for this merger is that the Department of Food Science has limited ability to meet the teaching and research needs in this area due to its small size. One major opportunity area for our food science program is food safety. The Department of Animal Science and Agricultural Biochemistry is internationally recognized for excellence, especially in the areas of poultry disease. The synergy among the disciplines in the two departments will be facilitated by the merger. Under the leadership of Dr. John K. Rosemberger, Chair and Allian Professor, the food science programs can achieve this potential.

The College of Agricultural Sciences is committed to supporting and nurturing this merger. Faculty lines lost in the Department of Food Science due to terminations, resignations and retirements will be replaced. Faculty and students space will be reallocated to make room for food science laboratories, faculty and students.

The merger will strengthen the undergraduate and graduate programs of the new Department of Animal and Food Sciences. The attached documents present the undergraduate curriculum. The addition of a fifth concentration to the Animal Science curriculum in the area of Food Science indicates how smoothly this transition will be made. Policy statements on promotion and tenure and graduate programs have also been revised to fully incorporate the concerns of faculty and students.

We have presented the concept of the merger to our Agriculture Committee and they have endorsed the proposed action and reported their recommendation to the appropriate committees of the Board of Trustees. The faculty of the College of Agricultural Sciences are supportive of the concept.

Urge the Faculty Senate to act quickly and positively on the merger of the two departments to create a Department of Animal and Food Sciences.
