Life had not endorsed the proposed evaluation system, and after Senator J. Olson had reminded the Faculty Senate of its powers on matters governing student life, Secretary F. Dilley proposed to amend the recommendation by deleting the two "Whereas" clauses which made specific reference to that evaluation system, and to shorten the text of the "Resolved" section so that it would end after the words "1998-1999." The amendment was seconded by Senator J. Hildebrandt, and failed by a vote of 27 to 25.

The original resolution, listed below, was adopted by a vote of 49 to 6.

- WHEREAS, the University of Delaware Faculty Senate in May 1992 passed a resolution eliminating the Greek Pledging Process by 1997-1998, and
- WHEREAS, the University of Delaware Faculty Senate in May 1992 called for a new Greek Task Force for the academic year of 1997-1998 to re-evaluate the status of Greek life, and
- WHEREAS, the Office of Student Life has developed a Greek Organization Accreditation Process, effective in the academic year 1996-1997, and
- WHEREAS, this Greek Organization Accreditation Process will be a thorough review and evaluation of each Greek organization in the areas of academic progress, f i n a n c i a l m a n a g e m e n t , university/community/relations and service, campus involvement, and membership intake, therefore be it
- RESOLVED, that the imposition of the "no pledging" resolution be postponed until 1998-1999 to allow the University to evaluate the progress made through the Accreditation Process.

PRESIDENT-ELECT CANDIDATES' STATEMENTS

Martuza, Victor

In recent years, the Senate seems to have become a mere shadow of its former self. The spirited debates of the apartheid and Aumiller eras have been replaced by a bureaucratic humdrum so boring that faculty have to be coerced by deans and chairs to stand for Senate elections. The recent Senate approval of the college mergers without serious study or debate on the Senate floor, and the failure of the Senate to take the administration to task for ignoring affirmative action and diversity principles when it comes to hiring new chairs, deans and vice-presidents are just two examples of its present moribund state. If elected, I will assume that others feel the same need for change and will join me in once again making the Senate a vital part of the university governance picture. I will also commit to working closely with the AAUP bargaining unit on issues of mutual interest and concern.

Mason, Charles E.

According to the University of Delaware Charter, the faculty shall have the care, control, government and instruction of students, subject, of course, to the bylaws. The primary mechanism for faculty to formulate and administer the academic and education policies of the university is through the faculty senate. The faculty senate, with its various faculty representatives, executive committee, associated faculty committees and key administrative officers, is the major governing body for making the University of Delaware function as a university.

I am concerned about some indications of where the faculty senate is or seems to be headed. These include: 1) what often appears as a dichotomy between some parts of the faculty senate, especially between the faculty and administrative portions; 2) apathy among faculty about serving in senate related functions; 3) lack of recognition, credit and reward for faculty and administrators who serve the university faculty senate; and 4) the lack of faculty involvement in the planning and decision process which are critical to the future of academics at the university. Because we operate in a dynamic environment, it is helpful to periodically examine the charter and bylaws in order to reflect on their intended purposes and to serve as a guide for resolving some of these issues. I believe we should continually evaluate and upgrade our position and work toward improving how we accomplish our common goals of providing a high quality education and extending the base of knowledge.

If elected president of the faculty senate, I would take steps to facilitate a closer working relationship among all aspects of the faculty senate on issues governing and setting the future course of the university. Teamwork would be an important theme in order to accomplish the tasks associated with university governance. Everyone in the campus community, especially the students, can benefit from improving the way we set academic policies and provide high quality educational services. Receiving and acting on input from students, staff and non-faculty professionals should also be a part of the process. I believe that we have the appropriate mechanism for carrying out the charge for faculty as stated in the Charter. I am not inclined to urge any structural changes in the faculty senate. However, I believe a lot can be done to improve how it functions. My goals include challenging the senate to work more effectively, harmoniously, and proactively, and to recognize those individuals who make a difference through their contribution to this important process. I believe it is important for the faculty senate to be a strong component of governance of the university. Also, it is important that all aspects of the university community be considered in decision-making processes.

Approval to increase EDDV 800 from 3 to 6 credits

The Graduate Program Committee approved the request of the Mathematics Education Faculty to increase the number of hours students may enroll in EDDV 800 from 3 to 6 credits. The reason for the request is that students in the Ph.D. program with an emphasis in Mathematics Education will be required to enroll in a one-credit research seminar during their first six semesters in the program. The goal of this requirement is to involve the students in research experiences early in their program and to provide a forum for them to critique and prepare research proposals.

Attachment A is the revised description of the Ph.D. specialization in Mathematics Education. Attachment B is a set of three pages to request a change in EDDV 800 to allow students to take the course for six rather than three credits.

Ph.D. Specialization Mathematics Education



Mathematics Education is concerned with the learning and teaching of mathematics. The philosophy of the program is that effective instruction in mathematics is based on the best information about how students learn mathematics. The program is designed to promote significant research in this domain.

- 1. <u>Prerequisites</u> (in addition to Admission Requirements)
 - A. B.A. or equivalent in mathematics
 - B. School teaching experience in mathematics

II. Program

- A. Specialization (18 hours)
 - 1. Scheduled courses (12 hours). The following are offered regularly; others are offered periodically.

EDDV 834 Development of Mathematical Thinking

EDDV 835 Past and Current Issues in Mathematics Education

EDDV 836 Problem-Solving in Mathematics

2. Research Seminar (6 hours). Students are required to take EDDV 800, a one-hour seminar, during their first six semesters in the program. The seminar provides a forum for proposing and examining research in mathematics education.

B. Minor (12 hours)

- 1. If the candidate enters the program with less than nine graduate hours in mathematics, the minor should be in mathematics and will consist of mathematics courses at the graduate level.
- If the candidate enters with nine or more graduate hours in mathematics, the
 minor will be chosen by the candidate with the advisor's approval.
 Recommended minors are mathematics, science, computer science, cognitive
 psychology, human development, instructional psychology, measurement and
 evaluation, statistics and research design, and curriculum.
- C. Any alterations in this program, agreed to by the student and the advisor, require approval of the mathematics education faculty.

The Department of Nursing has approved the proposed changes in the grading policy for undergraduate nursing and is seeking approval from the Undergraduate Faculty Senate. The rationale for the requested change is two-fold. First, it is our intention to make the department grading policies more consistent with those of the overall university. Also such a change would make the clinical and didactic department policies internally consistent.

The department's previous policy required a minimum grade of (73.34) C in any nursing course and allowed for no limit on repeating didactic nursing courses. The significant changes include accepting a minimum grade in nursing courses of C- and limiting the repeating of any nursing course to two attempts.

Requested Policy Change

A minimum cumulative grade-point index of 2.0 is required to enroll in all nursing courses. In order to meet degree requirements, nursing majors must have a minimum cumulative grade-point index of 2.0 to progress in the nursing sequence. A student who earns a grade lower than C- in a nursing course must repeat the course and achieve a grade of at least C- before enrolling in a more advanced nursing course.

(Students are not permitted to repeat any nursing course more than once.) Further, students who earn a grade lower than C- in more than one nursing course will not be permitted to continue in the program. Program policies are currently under review, and all students must meet regularly with their faculty advisor to ensure that all requirements are being met.
