

REGULAR MEETING OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY SENATE

September 12, 1977

MINUTES

The regular meeting of the University Faculty Senate was called to order by Pres. Pikulski at 4:00 p.m. Senators not in attendance were:

I. Adoption of the Agenda. Pres. Pikulski announced that, at the request of the sponsoring Senator, Item D had been withdrawn. He then asked for the following changes in the order of the Agenda, to facilitate consideration of the COPE and Senate committee appointments: Items E and new Items G and H from the addendum to become Items A, B and C. There were no further changes and no objections, and the Agenda was adopted as amended.

II. Approval of the Minutes. Senate Secretary Van Name reported the following corrections to the Minutes of the May 2, 1977 Senate meeting:

Page 4, Item D, the second sentence should read "As the report did not come from a standing committee of the Senate it did not come as a resolution moved and seconded." In the same section the next sentence should be changed: "Professor Halio said that originally it had been expected that this would be given to the Committee on Student Life, but that that Committee was back-logged and instead it was sent to the Senate Executive Committee which [here the words 'reviewed it and' should be added] suggested the current procedure." The final sentence at the end of the second paragraph should read "After further discussion the word 'usual' was submitted for 'automatic,' but not accepted. After a call for a quorum, a vote was taken and the resolution was passed as amended by a vote of 21 yeas and 9 nays."

There were no objections and the Minutes were approved as corrected.

III. Remarks by President Trabant. After a word of welcome Pres. Trabant began his remarks to the Senate by noting that, for the first time, the Board of Trustees had approved a deficit operating budget for the University. He showed three slides detailing: 1) expected revenue for this fiscal year (a total of about \$95,750,000); 2) operating expenses for the fiscal year (about \$96,655,000) and the projected operating deficit (about \$900,000); and 3) reductions in operating expenses which have been effected (totalling about \$1.1 million). With regard to these reductions, Pres. Trabant noted that without them the deficit could have been closer to two million dollars, and that the vast majority of them had been achieved without having to dismiss people.

He then discussed the alternatives for eliminating the deficit--to increase income or to reduce expenditures--and concluded that since it would be extremely difficult to further reduce the operating budget in this fiscal year it would be necessary to increase income. In reviewing the University's sources of income he noted that it would take an increase of 18 million dollars in the endowment to

provide \$900,000 income on an annual basis. With regard to tuition, Pres. Trabant said that the University already had the most expensive combined fees of the top 50 state public universities, and was the 6th most expensive of the land grant institutions but that, despite a decision not to increase the fees for the fall semester it would be necessary to increase them in the Spring by \$20 to \$50 dollars (\$40 to \$100 on an annual basis). For the third source of income, state appropriations, Pres. Trabant said that the University would make a request to the State for a supplemental appropriation of \$450,000 on a continuing basis. In discussing the financial difficulties of the State of Delaware he reviewed the existing commitments of the State to the three newer institutions of higher education (Del. Tech.) and to the University and to Delaware State, noting that over the last few years, of the percentage of increase going into higher education in the State budget the increase going to the University had been modest relative to the others, and that the 1% cut-back in State appropriations and the elimination of the DIMER funds, which had then had to be absorbed by the regular University budget, had reduced the net increase in income from the State to about \$90,000 for the current fiscal year. He concluded his remarks by expressing his hope that the State financial picture will continue its recent improvement.

IV. Announcements. Pres. Pikulski announced that the Senate Executive Committee has decided to eliminate the special Senate mailing list for Agenda with attachments and would now send this material to all faculty, with the intent to review this policy and assess its costs at the end of the year.

He also announced that the General Faculty Meeting had been moved forward to October 10 to enable Pres. Trabant to be present, and he urged the Senators to attend. Pres. Pikulski concluded by encouraging the chairpersons and members of the various Senate committees to be in close contact with the Executive Committee, especially with regard to committee actions which needed to be brought before the Senate.

V. New Business.

Item A of the amended Agenda, a request for Senate approval of the Provost's appointments to COPE, was introduced by Pres. Pikulski. There was no discussion and a motion was made, seconded and passed by unanimous voice vote to approve the following appointments:

Item B, the approval of appointments to Senate committees, was introduced by Prof. Sandler, chairperson of the Committee on Committees. He made the following additions to the list which had been distributed with the Agenda: P. McCarthy, Chairperson, Committee on the Performing Arts; G. Bonner, member, Committee on the Performing Arts; W. Boyer, member and Chairperson, Committee on International Studies; C. Schiffman, member, Committee on Undergraduate Studies. There were no questions or discussion and the list, with the above additions, was approved by unanimous voice vote. (Note: the 1977-78 Senate committee membership listing is attached.)

Item C, the election by the Senate of one of the members of the new University Review Committee for Academic Complaints to chair the Committee, was conducted by Pres. Pikulski, who announced that two members had agreed to be nominated: J.D. Culley and G. Nocito. While ballots were being distributed Pres. Pikulski, at the request of Senator Braun, read the brief charge to the Committee. (Note: Prof. Culley was elected to chair the Committee.)

Item D, a resolution to change the name and organization of the College of Home Economics, was introduced by Prof. Mosberg, chairperson of the 1976-77 Coordinating Committee on Education which had reviewed the proposal and prepared the recommendation to the Senate. Prof. Mosberg said that the Committee had felt that the proposed name was more appropriate to the actual work of the College, and that they had felt the division of the faculty into departments would be advantageous for both academic and administrative reasons. He also called attention to the last sentence of the resolution, emphasizing the Committee's strong feeling that the reorganization should come out of existing funds in the College. In response to questions from Senator Finner, Prof. Mosberg said that the change would not become effective until it had been approved by the Board of Trustees, and affirmed that the division into departments would require chairpersons and therefore three additional administrators within the College. There was no further discussion and the following recommendation was approved by unanimous voice vote:

*RESOLVED, that the Faculty Senate recommends to the Board of Trustees that the name of the College of Home Economics be changed to the College of Human Resources and that the following three departments be established in the College of Human Resources: Department of Individual and Family Studies; Department of Food Science and Human Nutrition; Department of Textiles, Design, and Consumer Economics. It is further recommended that the cost of this reorganization be borne by the existing resources of the College.*

Item E, a resolution to approve a request for a change in the curriculum in the Department of Accounting, was introduced by Prof. Toensmeyer, chairperson of the 1976-77 Committee on Undergraduate Studies which had reviewed the proposal. Prof. Toensmeyer said that the change was requested because the department, in surveying its recent graduates, had found a deficiency in their communication skills. Senator Runkle, a member of the Communications Department, asked about the number of students this would add to courses and expressed a concern that it might result in requiring courses that students couldn't get into. Senator Buckmaster, a member of the Accounting Department, said that about 150 students were involved, and that, in consultation with the English Department and the Communications Department they had agreed on six courses which could be used to fulfill the requirement and they had felt that the larger selection of courses would mean that it would not create hardship for anyone. There was no further discussion and the following resolution was approved by unanimous voice vote:

*RESOLVED, that a communications requirement of one of the following six three-credit courses be added to the skills requirement of the Accounting curriculum:*

*Three credits will be removed from the free electives, reducing the non-business electives from 17 to 14 credits. The Accounting Department would like to implement this with the entering freshman class of '81.*

Item F, a resolution from the Committee on Promotions and Tenure for a change in the procedures to be followed when reviewing candidates for promotion to full professor, was introduced by Prof. Fieldhouse, chairperson of the 1976-77 Committee. He explained that the Committee had introduced the resolution because it had found that it was often difficult to go from associate to full professor because of the number of faculty of lower rank voting on the case, and they thought it would help if only full professors voted on such a promotion, using outside evaluators where there were not enough full professors within a department to review the candidate. Associate Provost Halio said that he felt that the proposed resolution differed from the recommendation in the final report of the Committee in requiring that only full professors vote on such promotions, thereby excluding input from department faculty members in some cases; he also noted that the resolution was contrary to existing bylaws in some departments.

Senator Cole read the following statement, which was vocally assented to by several other senators:

I would like to speak against the resolution as it is presented for several reasons, the most important of which is that it would destroy the autonomy of smaller units in matters of promotion and tenure.

It is my understanding that the present system of promotions and tenure was created in order to decentralize the process and place the focal power in the hands of the units where the candidate's qualifications should best be known.

The candidate's publications and reputation as a researcher and scholar are already being assessed by peers from outside the University. However, I believe that colleagues from the candidate's unit, regardless of rank, are most qualified to make an assessment in matters of teaching, advisement, thesis-dissertation supervision and contributions to the goals of the unit.

Finally, I would note that if the resolution were approved, the associate professors on the University Promotions and Tenure Committee would retain the right to judge the qualifications of candidates for promotion to full professor, while colleagues in the candidate's own unit, where he or she is best known, would not.

Dean Brown inquired as to whether the premise on which the recommendation was made was that assistant professors were not qualified to make the judgments, and Prof. Fieldhouse replied that it was not because one rank was more intelligent than another, but because of what the Committee had perceived as a conflict of interest when faculty members didn't want to promote people because it would affect their own chances.

Pres. Trabant noted that no one had spoken in support of the resolution and asked why it had come to the Senate floor. To the suggestion that the policy had, in fact, been implemented during the summer, Assoc. Provost Halio replied that the policy which had been implemented was not the same as the one called for by the resolution. Pres. Pikulski noted that the final report of the Promotions and Tenure Committee had been cited in the summer policy memo and it was felt appropriate to review the matter in the Senate.

Senator Finner moved to call the question; the motion was seconded and passed by unanimous voice vote. The following resolution was then defeated by unanimous voice vote, with no abstentions:

*RESOLVED, that departmental or college promotion and tenure committees that are evaluating candidates to the rank of full professor should consist of faculty members of that rank. This practice will require some units to bring in faculty from other units to serve on promotion and tenure committees.*

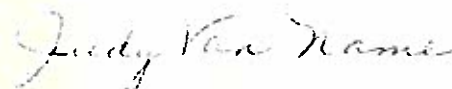
Item G, from the Rules Committee, was introduced by Pres. Pikulski, who noted that it was intended to clarify the statement in the Handbook as to the tenure in office of committee members and chairpersons. There was no discussion and the following paragraph was approved, by unanimous voice vote, to replace the last sentence of the existing 4th paragraph on I-13 of the Handbook:

*RESOLVED, that officers of the Senate (who with the immediate past president form the Executive Committee) shall take office at the end of the meeting at which they are elected. Committee members and chairs shall take office on September 1 following their election or appointment (with the exception of the Committee on Committees).*

Pres. Trabant agreed to a request from Senator Finner to use the remaining time to entertain some questions, and responded to the first question by saying that the figures he had presented earlier for the University's operating expenses did include a 5.5 wage increase, effective January 1, 1978, for all University employees. Senator Finner then inquired about University plans to use a possible refund of electrical rates from the City of Newark, and Pres. Trabant said that such a one-time refund could not be figured into the permanent operating budget. In response to a final question he said that the University's request to the State for a supplemental appropriation would be made in January.

The meeting was declared adjourned at 5:00 p.m.
